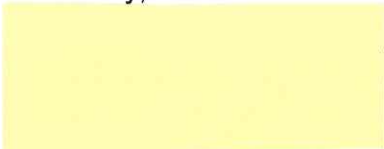
I heard you are building a new playground. I believe that you should have a spider web that connects to a slide. It should be on the big kid playground.
